'NEATH A WESTERN SKY: Bizzell Library space will be made more usable by groups and seating will double

Regents of the University of Oklahoma have approved a \$5 million plan that will double seating at the Bizzell Memorial Library.

Funding will be from both public and private sources.

Rick Luce, OU dean of libraries, said the work will recognize the trend of late in library usage. These days, he said, students tend to use a library for group study rather than for individual study.

Accordingly, big heavy tables will be replaced with smaller tables and chairs that can be moved aside or pushed together to accommodate larger groups.

Move to online textbooks The University has lately begun taking steps to cut back on students having to rely on the traditional textbook.

The costs of many of these textbooks has been rising at the rate of 8 per cent a year or so, OU officials note.

To ease the burden on student budgets, a push now is under way to rely on online materials.

Now, after one year of going in this direction, president David Boren estimates that students have been saved about \$1,400 of their typical annual textbook costs.

Work will be continued to make alternative source material available to OU students, particularly from online sources, Boren indicates.

Club's resources now exceed the \$100,000 mark

Earlier this year, the account the OU Club of Austin maintains with the University of Oklahoma Foundation passed the \$100,000 mark for the first time in the dub's 25-year history.

As of the end of February, the figure stood at \$100,615.06

The club also maintains an operating account here in Austin. Treasurer Jessica Benedict reported that \$4,117.36 was in that account earlier this month.

The Austin dub's main use of the larger fund is to help pay for scholarships the club grants each year to Central Texas high school graduates.

The operating fund usually is kept around the \$5,000 level. Any excess is periodically sent on to the Foundation in Norman and added to the club's account there...

2013 Sooner softball team: a benchmark for the ages

It's difficult to think that the college sports world will soon see another team, in any sport, so dominant as this year's Oklahoma softball team.

Solid defense, two world-class pitchers, timely hitting, intelligence on the basepaths, power, finesse, speed — it all was there, as Sooner fans will attest, and made for a wonderful experience.

All that culminated on a pleasant evening this month in Oklahoma City when coach Patty Gasso's team completed a two-game sweep of Tennessee for the national championship.

The Sooners, top-ranked nationally from the season's start to its finish, compiled a 57-4 record in this memorable year, didn't lose a game after May 5 (at Kansas) and won a number of individual honors, as well.

Players cited Three OU players were finalists for the sport's player of the year award. Pitcher Keilani Ricketts won the honor (as she did the year before). Others in the running were pitcher Michelle Gascoigne and infielder Lauren Chamberlain.

Also, three Sooners were named to the sport's Team USA roster — Ricketts, Chamberlain and outfielder Destinee Martinez.

Four Sooners made the coaches' All

America team: Ricketts and Chamberlain on the first team; outfielder Brianna Turang and infielder Shelby Pendley, second team.

In postseason play (10 games) OU was 91-16 in cumulative runs scored.

<u>Tornado relief</u> Help for victims of the two tornado outbreaks in Oklahoma during May came from all sides.

The West Virginia baseball team, awaiting the start of the Big XII tournament in Oklahoma City, was given \$100 each by their university. With this, they shopped for clothing, flashlights and other items that might be of use in Moore and other communities facing cleanup.

Also, a University of Iowa alumnus Mike Riggan, who operates a trucking company in that state, filled two 18-wheelers and sent them to the Regional Food Bank of Oklahoma.

Riggan had contacted Iowa football coach Kirk Ferentz and asked him to check with OU coach Bob Stoops about getting Sooner football players' help in unloading the trucks. Some 20 Sooner team members volunteered.

And Texas A&M and its softball team also sent a truck full of items to Oklahoma.

Then, the Saturday between the two tornado outbreaks, OU administrators, coaches and athletes spent the day helping with cleanup, mostly in Moore.

<u>Castiglione honored</u> The National Football Foundation recently honored OU athletic director Joe Castiglione.

He "has demonstrated superior administrative abilities and shown outstanding dedication to college athletics and particularly college football," said the citation accompanying the award.

Castiglione was applauded also for the people he has hired for the athletic department, as well as for his fundraising success and facilities-improvement program.

Mitchell Park expansion? Greg Tipton, associate athletic director at OU, told The Daily Oklahoman recently that the University is considering expanding seating capacity at L. Dale Mitchell baseball park to some 5,000.

"Whatever we do," Tipton said, with the way the Sooner program is going, plans for OU baseball "need to be huge."

<u>Five kickoff times set</u> Kickoff times for five Sooner football games this fall now are known.

Starts of 6 p.m. are planned for the Louisiana-Monroe and West Virginia games. Tulsa will be at 11 a.m., Notre Dame at 2:30 p.m. and Baylor 6:30 p.m

<u>Courtney Paris waived</u> The Tulsa Shock of the WNBA has waived former OU women's basketball star Courtney Paris in favor of a rookie player.


The four-time Sooner All American was drafted seventh in 2009 and played for four WNBA teams.
