## Scholarships' number and \$\$\$ amount to rise?

## Board reviews treasurer's insightful 7-year study

The possibility of increasing the amount of scholarships per student given out each year by the OU Club of Austin has become more likely.

The club's board of directors were given a detailed fiscal study at their meeting this month by Treasurer Jessica Benedict that made clear the impact on the club treasury of any changes.

Sentiment has been running strong on the board of late that if the club can afford it, more money per recipient would be a great help to students. And perhaps more scholarships might be granted, as well.

Jessica's detailed number crunching presented the board with figures for granting the present three \$2,000 scholarships per years to as many as seven scholarships ranging up to \$3,500 each.

The figures she presented showed the effects on the present \$72,000 or so the club has available for its grants. She showed two figures for each of the next seven years, through 2017.

One set of figures was based on no additional contributions to the fund (which hasn't happened in any year).

The second set showed the effect based on the average amount of money contributed annually in recent years by club members to the fund.

Board members were encouraged to take a look at increasing the amount when a club member contributed another \$10,000 for scholarships recently.

The club member, who asked for anonymity, also said s/he is open to making further such contributions.

And the donor expressed particular interest in hearing of any deserving student who wants to attend the University of Oklahoma but could not do so without receiving a full scholarship.

The board will convene next on Apr. 21 to review scholarship applications

for this year. As with all meetings of the club board, members of the OU Club of Austin are welcome to attend.

Scholarship applications must be postmarked by Apr. 1 to be considered. Applications are on the club's website: http://www.ouclubofaustin.com, then click "OU Scholarship Awards."

Alisa Macy scholarship chair, told the board that usually some 15-20 applications are received each year.

Cross country team excels Also having a fine season this year was the Sooner cross country team, which finished a school record 5th in the national meet.

Moreover, the team was named a national all-academic team for its class-room performance.

The men's and women's golf programs are doing well this spring.

The women's track and field team recorded a program-best sixth-place finish in the NCAA indoor meet, as the Sooner men's and women's teams combined to add eight All-Americans to their growing list of national winners.

The wrestling team, ranked 7th nationally, will appear in the national tourney at Philadelphia this weekend.

And the OU tennis teams are playing well. The men's and women's teams have just two losses each so far and are ranked in the top 25 nationally.

Lamar court named for Tubbs The basketball court at Lamar University in Beaumont now bears the name of

Billy Tubbs and his wife of 52 years, Pat.

The former OU coach, who excelled at the Sooner helm in 1980-94, is a Lamar alumnus now in his 27th year of service to the school. He has served as basketball coach and athletic director and presently is special assistant to the LU president.

Nothing tops college days Recent OU football standout Gerald McCoy took the court at halftime of a recent Sooner women's basketball game with Baylor.. But most fans thought he was Boomer, the OU mascot.

When McCoy took off the costume head he was wearing, the stands erupted.

Fresh from a good rookie NFL season, McCoy recalled for the crowd how it was in college:

"When I would roll over on game day here, I was always so excited. Not because I had a game, even though I do love the sport, but because of the atmosphere, man.

"The fans here are the best in the country. Game day in Norman, Oklahoma, is on another level. You see people setting up tents two days before. You see them lined up down the street on Lindsey. That's great to see.

"The NFL atmosphere is OK. But it's nothing like college," McCoy said.

# Liking what he sees, Boren, now in his 17th year at OU, wants 25-plus

David Boren has made it official. He wants to become the longest-serving president in the history of the University of Oklahoma.

Speaking during a campus observance of his becoming the second-longest-serving president last month, Dr. Boren said he wants to exceed the 25 years that George Lynn Cross served (1943-1968).

"Dr. Cross was my mentor," Boren said. He was my teacher and my very dear friend. I think he would approve of me setting out to break his record.

"So I have about eight more years

to go. I'm going to eat my Wheaties and ride my stationary bike and try to do it."

He would be 79 when he surpasses Dr. Cross. Boren has also served Oklahoma as its 21st governor (1975-79) and as a U.S. Senator (1979-94).

His unflagging enthusiasm for his job in Norman was evident in a recent letter to OU donors.

Calling his time as OU's president "the most rewarding years of my life," his letter spelled out only the latest in a series of steps forward the University has made in recent years.

# 'NEATH A WESTERN SKY: Tsunami leaves Japanese student group at OU stymied about returning home

A group of 19 Japanese students who have spent the last month studying at the University of Oklahoma was wondering over last weekend just when they might be permitted to fly back home to Japan.

The group, students at Japan's Ritsumeikan University, had completed their month's work at OU and planned to fly out of Oklahoma City over the weekend.

Donna DeLuca, director of the Center for English as a Second Language at OU, told *The Norman Transcript* that some emotional relief had been provided by most of the students being in contact with their families via email and Facebook.

Also, the *Transcript* reported that eight OU students studying in varying regions of Japan also were not harmed during last Friday morning's earthquake. This was according to Jack Hobson, director of Education Abroad at OU, which handles the arrangements for outgoing students.

Hobson said the university has contacted each of the eight OU students in Japan. Most of them are studying in the south of the country, farther from the most heavily damaged areas.

One OU student studying in Yamagata, Japan — the closest of the eight to the destruction — noted power outages as the primary aftermath of the quake, Hobson said.

He said the students are still attending classes as normal.

OU student in the fashion world GQ magazine, which deals with men's clothing fashions, recently featured a tie designed by an OU senior, Michael Hitsman, who also has established his own menswear company this year.

Wade was publisher of *The Elk City Daily News*, former president of the Oklahoma Press Assn. and the Oklahoma Newspaper Fdn. He was appointed in 2004 to the Board by then-Gov. Brad Henry.

David Boren, OU president, said "Larry was a champion for students. His first priority was more scholarships for students.

"He was a loyal friend and a valued adviser to me for over 40 years."

OU researchers score Fossils recovered in the mid-1990s by a team of researchers from OU's natural history museum have been determined to be that of a formerly unknown species.

The discovery has just been described in a British scientific journal. The article was written by an international research team that includes Richard L. Cifelli, curator of vertebrate paleontology at OU's Sam Noble Oklahoma Museum of Natural History.

The article describes the recovery of the fossils of an adult and a juvenile dinosaur by Sam Noble researchers in Utah.

The new species, believed to date back 110 million years, has been named

Brontomerus Mcintoshi, known by the nickname "Thunder Thighs"

The remains are in Norman at the Noble museum.

Museum addition on schedule The \$13 million addition to the Fred Jones Jr. Museum of Art on the OU campus is proceeding as scheduled and will be available to the public this fall.


